### CULVER CITY-FOSHAY LODGE INSTALLS THE OFFICERS FOR 2011

On January 9<sup>th</sup>, the members of Culver City-Foshay Lodge assembled around the checkered pavement of their impressive lodge room for the 90th installation of their officers. The Worshipful Curtis Scott Shumaker was invested with the responsibilities of leadership and was seated in the Oriental Chair. Those who were installed with him to serve the lodge were: Masato Francis Taguchi, Senior Warden; Mahmoud Ghaffari, PM, Junior Warden; Douglas Scott Warner, Treasurer; Clarence David Kussner, PM, Secretary; Edward Calzaretto, Chapalain; Curtis James Falzoi, Senior Deacon; Snohomish Kevin Brown, Junior Deacon; Kenneth Leonell Burgess, II, Marshal; Sam House, Senior Steward; Brian Engelman, Junior Steward; Merrick Rees Hamer, PM, Organist; and George Joseph Wollin, Tyler.

After the retiring Master, Jonathan Paul Dilley, offered his remarks, summarizing the previous year and bidding propitious days to his successor, the evening began with the officers, attired in the white gloves and aprons, making their stately entrance, accompanied by the music of Brahms, led by the Master of Ceremonies, Christopher R. Sanders, PM. An invocation of God was sounded by the voice of Carroll Robins Runyon,

serving as the Installing Chaplain, and the national emblem was conducted into the room by members of Bethel No. 2, International Order of Job's Daughters, for the pledge of allegiance. Each officer was enjoined with the important duties of his office by the Right Worshipful John L. Cooper, III, PM, Junior Grand Warden and Past Master of the present lodge, and was conducted to his proper place or station. The last officer installed was the Master who gave his assent to the ancient charges of the craft. He was presented with the sacred symbols of Geometry and Architecture and the Charter of the Lodge. Thence, he was conducted to the oriental seat and was invested with the traditional gavel.

Worshipful Shumaker introduced poet Brother Bryan D. Dietrich who recited several selections from his vast reservoir of original verse. Brother Dietrich is nationally recognized for his achievement in literature and has been hailed by many scholarly journals for his contribution to poetry. Recently raised a Master Mason in Oklahoma, his selections included thematic material on the "Lost Word," making a memorable impression upon the brethren. Several presentations were made, including the traditional apron to the Retired Master who pledged his continued support for the lodge. After the formal benediction, accompanied by the musical strains of "Dona Nobis Pacem," the assemblage reconvened downstairs for a gourmet meal prepared by chef George Wollin.

There is anticipation that the ensuing year will include many endeavours to stimulate the intellection and learning abilities of the brethren. Worshipful Shumaker, a professor of English has already established a sequence of book discussion groups that inspire Masonic, intellectual thought. His hope is to reintroduce the traditional "Saints John Day," and add to the enviable and massive library of the lodge, including the acquisition of a complete set of the Oxford English Dictionary. A perusal of the lodge's Trestleboards will reveal Worshipful Shumaker's aspiration to develop a "book of Hours," similar to an almanac designed for daily encouragement of Masonic thought and actions.
