LODGE OF INSTRUCTION SCHEDULED FOR MAY 17

Brethren, it is my will and pleasure that a Lodge of Instruction be opened in the First Degree on Wednesday, the 17th of May, 2006, Anno Lucis 6006 at Culver City-Foshay Masonic Temple at 7:00 of the Clock for the purpose of Instruction and to promote Masonic Fellowship.

Therefore, it is my direction that all Entered Apprentices and Fellowcraft Masons of this Lodge present themselves at that time and place, suitably attired for further instruction in Masonry. Master Masons of this Lodge are also strongly urged to attend and support their Brothers in Masonry. The Lodge will be tyled and not open to non-masons. Master Masons with proper Masonic credentials from other Lodges are welcome to attend and may bring interested Entered Apprentices and Fellowcrafts from their Lodges for whom they can properly and fully vouch, as guests for the evening.

DRESS CODE FOR SIDELINERS: Dark Suits, white shirts and subdued pattern ties are requested



from all attendees if at all possible. At minimum, coat and tie required.

DRESS CODE FOR PARTICIPANTS AND OFFICERS: Tuxedos with white gloves for all except Master who will be attired in white tie and tails, cuffs, collar and apron. Well shined black shoes and socks for all.

PURPOSE AND AGENDA: This Lodge of Instruction will feature lectures from several preeminent Master Masons on the history, purpose and practice of York Rite and Scottish Rite Freemasonry and a demonstration and explanation of a typical Chamber of Reflection as used in English and Continental Lodges. The Lodge will open promptly at 7:00 in the evening and close promptly at 9:00 when we will adjourn to the salon for light refreshment and fellowship. Latecomers will not be admitted during certain portions of the ceremony so please be prompt, always remembering our parking situation.

THE VENUE: This Lodge of Instruction will be holden, in so far as we can accomplish it, in the manner of an English Lodge of Emulation which is quite different from what most American Masons are familiar with. Officers will enter in formal procession already wearing their aprons and jewels. All ceremonies are conducted with great formality and gravity and we will have a demonstration of voting in the English fashion as well as other ceremonies as appropriate. There will be Masonic music played at intervals.

THE REASON: It is the duty of the Master of a Lodge to see to the education and advancement of those Brothers who have not attained the Sublime Degree of Master Mason and to prepare them to assume their proper place in the Masonic Life of

their Lodge to the extent he can do so. One way to do this is to provide inspiration and encouragement, and a Lodge of Instruction is designed to do just that - to inspire as well as encourage.

Many of you have, for one reason or another, not continued to advance through the degrees as is your right. It is my duty as Master of this Lodge to ascertain the reasons for this and to provide suitable assistance to any Brother who desires it in order that he may fully enjoy the benefits and privileges of our antient fraternity.

MY INTENTION: To produce a Masonic evening which will give those of you who have never traveled Masonically, the opportunity to experience, in some small degree (pardon the pun), Freemasonry as you might see it practiced in England, Scotland or elsewhere in the world. Hopefully, it will be an enlightening and educational experience and steady your resolve to complete your degrees and join us in full Masonic fellowship as Master Masons and to assume your rightful places in the management of the Lodge.

FINAL WORD: While this message falls short of an Official Masonic Summons, I am directing all the Brothers of Culver City-Foshay Lodge to make every effort to attend and unless I hear directly from you in the form of an e-mail, telephone call or letter, I will assume that you will be in attendance, and shall direct my Junior Warden to plan refreshments accordingly. Realizing that many of our Brothers live somewhat more than a cable tow's distance from the Lodge or have otherwise reached and in some cases, gone beyond the "golden years", I will understand and regretfully forgo your presence with no additional notification required. We will of course, miss your friendship and consel and wish you health and happiness whithersoever disbursed around the globe. Everyone else: Please be present or accounted for. FROM THE WEST



I have decided to break from my usual report on the upcoming events and degrees In rder to send you all the first of hopefully many reports on Masonic Education. I have found many topics of interest in my search; however I decided to use my first article to illustrate the convention of the First Continental Congress in 1774.

The First Continental Congress convened in Philadelphia's Carpenters Hall on September 5th 1774. Twelve of the thirteen colonies sent delegates, Georgia was facing desperate problems and needed the support of the regular British.

The First Congress did not originally advocate independence, it sought to right the wrongs inflicted on the colonies and hoped that a unified voice would gain them some attention so that their grievances might be heard in London. It was hoped at the time that a peaceful objective could be obtained. The thirteen colonies sent 55 delegates; they were mostly men of good social standing (Under the tongue of good report and coming well recommended). Many of them being from different backgrounds and from the different colonies did not know each other, however after frequent meetings and dinners, important friendships came about. Of the prominent members in attendance were George Washington, John Adams, Patrick Henry, Joseph Galloway and Samuel Adams.

The first plan was a consideration of John Galloway to create an American Parliament to act in concert or cooperation with the British Parliament. This idea was not taken in agreement with the other members; however, it was primarily an attempt to reach a peaceful harmony with the British. Before any agreement could be reached however, Paul Revere arrived with the Suffolk Resolves (a series of political statements by a numbers of Boston area communities). These speeches further distanced the members of congress. After time the radical elements gained the upper hand and Galloway's peaceful plan was vetoed.

An association (or committee) was formed to boycott by means of non-importation, non-exportation

of goods. These agreements were enforced by other committees in each community who would publish names of merchants who did not honor the boycott and encouraged public frugality.

The Congress composed a Statement of American complaints. It was addressed to King George III to whom the delegates still for the most part remained loyal. This statement of complaints was the first official declaration addressed to the King.

Finally, this First Congress agreed to convene again if the complaints addressed to the King were not properly honored. That meeting of the Second Continental Congress was called in May 1775.

The majority of the members of the delegates of the First Continental Congress were Masons. I hope that in reading this article you notice as I did numerous similarities to our own meetings familiar to you.
