



A Cable's Length from Shore


The entered apprentice goes through his degree and learns his penalties, often not fully understanding some of the details, including the measurement of a cable length. We understand that it is a measurement of distance. But how and why was it chosen for our craft?

At the time that freemasonry was being formalized and lodges were being established, Great Britain was the world's major naval power. The British navy had its Articles of War, with which each enlisted man was familiar. The penalty for treason was to be hanged from the yardarm and then, after a suitable time, buried a cables' length from shore in the tidal flats, which was considered neither sea nor land; and it was where the garbage was also dumped, the proper place to bury a traitor. A cable's length was a term used in naval and maritime settings and this is more than likely the reason for such form of measurement to be included in our allegory.

A cable is made by first twisting fibers into yarn and the yarn is then twisted the opposite direction, or counter twisted, into strands. Multiple strands are then counter twisted to form the rope. Several ropes are then counter twisted to form the cable. If it wasn't for each successive part being twisted the opposite direction the whole cable would unwind once tension was released, but the care paid to building to the cable's strength is based on the unity from the several parts composing it.

Now, all the cables on board a ship are all the same length. That's because of the length of the ropewalk where they are made. Some are 100 fathoms, while others could be as long as 130. In the British Navy, the standard length of a cable is one hundred fathoms, or six hundred feet. That was chosen because it is one-tenth of a nautical mile. Thus, we understand the cable's use a measurement of distance.

Cleopatra's Needle; And Its Link To Freemasonry

Greetings Brethren!

A few weeks ago at the Esoteric Club meeting I had the pleasure of sharing some information about "Cleopatra's Needle," an ancient Egyptian Obelisk that resides today in Central Park, NYC. Since the presentation was well received, it seemed appropriate to share some of the details for those who were not in attendance that day.

As many of my brothers at Foshay know, I grew up in NYC and often travel there. As a child, I found the fact that an actual, ancient Egyptian relic stood in a lonely part of Central Park almost unbelievable. But what is is more remarkable is how much more important this symbol from my childhood would become to me later in life.

Cleopatra's Needle was carved from the quarries of Aswan and originally erected in Heliopolis nearly 3500 years ago, in 1450 B.C. It was then moved to Alexandria and placed in the Caesarium, a temple built by Cleopatra. The needle is 69 feet high and weighs approximately 224 tons.

The needle was gifted to America by the Khedive of Egypt. But, what does this have to do with Freemasonry? Enter William H. Vanderbilt; tycoon, philanthropist and Freemason. Vanderbilt offered \$100,000 to anyone who could organize an effort to retrieve the obelisk from Alexandria. The offer was accepted by Henry Honeychurch Gorringe, a Lieutenant Commander of the US Navy, and also a Freemason. Vanderbilt and Gorringe then arranged a team of experts, (many of which were Freemasons) to set out on the expedition.

Through tremendous effort and engineering, a plan was born. The team arrived in Alexandria and began the monumental task. However, after lifting the obelisk off its pedestal, an amazing discovery was made. Gorringe and his team found what they believed to be indisputable symbols and artifacts connecting Freemasonry to the Obelisk and Ancient Egypt. In the pedestal they found a trowel, a square, a plummet, as well as a perfect cube of polished white syenite in the North East corner, a rough cube of syenite in the center of the pedestal and many other references that Freemason's would recognize. The find was confirmed by the GL of Egypt (they were not in exile at that time) and the decision was made to move not just the obelisk but the entirety of its pedestal, another 50 tons.

Once the obelisk arrived in New York (a journey worthy of its own article), the artifacts were again confirmed to be conclusively Masonic by the Grand Lodge of NY. The pedestal was painstakingly installed on the brow of a hill behind the Metropolitan Museum of Art, exactly as it was arranged in Alexandria.

In 1880, the Grand Master of Masons in NY led a parade of over 9,000 Masons in full regalia, up 5th avenue and into Central Park to Masonically lay the cornerstone of the Needle. The huge assembly ended the ceremony with a battery of three by three, which must have been quite a sight, and sound.

The Obelisk resides in the same location to this day, including all of the symbols found in its base. While there may be some debate about our connection to Ancient Egypt as Freemasons, it's safe to conclude that these great builders found similar inspiration in the same tools and emblems. These Operative Stonemasons and their speculative connection to these tools was enough to cement them for time immemorial, documenting their craft.


