
As from the smoke is freed the blaze, So let our faith burn bright! And if they crush our golden ways, Who e'er can crush Thy light?

The Halloween and Walpurgis festivals may indeed yield fun and entertainment to their celebrators while, at the same time, in a subliminal way it they express acceptance of subcultures and the unconventional, even as Freemasonry offers a wide mantle of Brotherly Love and Affection to cover humanity, regardless of their faithful visions.

Frunthe Lamp of Knowledge?


Die Erste Walpurgisnacht

As this trestleboard seems dedicated to a distinctly Halloween theme, it may seem fitting to mention a European counterpart to the popular American observance in which men, women and children don garments to emulate witches, demons and goblins as the month of October draws to a close. Although the European celebration occurs at May Day's Eve, exactly six months apart from the famous American celebration, the themes and concepts expressed in the two events are similar. The annual occurrence of the former, associated with the name of an English missionary, (ca. 710-777/9), is generally called the Walpurgis Night, although due the extensive treatment of the subject by the great German Poet,



Goethe, the appellation Walpurgistnacht has become quite customary. The European celebration is of pagan origin and it may seem peculiar that its name has derived from the life of a Christian Saint. Saint Walpurga lived a cloistered life as a nun, yet aspects attributed to her are not irreconcilable with pagan concepts. She was regarded as the Christian protector against the attack of wolves and it has been claimed that from her loosely rock hewn grave exuded miraculous oil, which could be reminiscent of practices of an old nature religion. In the case of Walpurgis Night, the culture was druidic. The association may seem less incongruous when we realize that the Easter celebration might have been the work of primitive Christians confounding the resurrection principle with a coaeval pagan tradition, necessary to its eventual popular acceptance. The celebration spread throughout Europe, yet it is a German appeal that has found a connection with it in Freemasonry.

For this connection to be realized, it would be helpful to remember that Freemasonry is a product of the European Enlightenment, a time when human thought was guided by reason and avoided superstition and blind faith. As in the previous age of the Renaissance, thought ventured into new territories previously discouraged. Varied explanations have been offered to delineate and define the Enlightenment, but most would include the German poet Johann Wolfgang von Goethe (1749-1832) as one of its proponents. Goethe featured Walpurgisnacht in his greatest work Faust, but it was in his poem entitled Die Erste Walpurgisnacht (The First Walpurgis Night) that we may view a transformation concerning religious attitudes of the time. Non-Christian ideas might be viewed sympathetically after meeting persecution during this age, even as Christianity was itself once an object of persecution. Some very Masonic notions are identified among pagans in their efforts to defend themselves against Christian persecutors.







Annittees

The Grand Lodge Annual Communication produced some significant changes to our craft as evidenced by the article you see in this Trestleboard. Please take advantage of the Grand Lodge Website to keep up to date on all the changes. The website also makes it easy to change your personal information such as correction of spelling, addresses, phone numbers, factual data etc.

At the beginning of his year the Master sets his budget. We, as members of the Lodge should be mindful of his budget before making motions involving expenditures. Any member may during the discussion of the motion on the floor, make a motion to postpone the original motion until such time (a defined future date or indefinitely) it can be determined if the expenditure is within the Master's Budget.

Motion for Postponement:

- May be either indefinite or to a defined time.
- Requires a second
- Debatable, but only as to the wisdom of postponing.
- May be made during the debate on the main question.

EXAMPLE

"Worshipful Master" (sign and recognition) "I move that further consideration of this Member: motion be postponed until (after Grand Lodge, or until the next Stated Meeting or until it can be determined if it fits in the budget)".

W.M. "Is there a second?"

Second Member: "I will second the motion."

W.M. "Is there any discussion on whether we should postpone consideration of this motion (until after Grand Lodge or until the next Stated Meeting or until it can be determined if it fits in the budget)? If none, I will call for a vote on the motion to postpone." (Vote Taken)

W.M. "The motion is carried." (Gavel) "There will be no further discussion of the original motion until (the time chosen if any)". or "The motion is lost." (Gavel) "We will continue the discussion on the original motion."

Grand Lodge Communication

The 163rd annual Grand Lodge Communication has concluded. Your elected officers attended the session and listened to many interesting arguments regarding resolutions to change Masonic law in California. We will inform you about all the changes on our Website.

For the present, however, please note that, as a result of legislation, Entered Apprentices and Fellow-crafts will now be permitted to attend Stated Meetings of their lodges, although they will not have voting privileges until they become Master Masons. Entered Apprentices and Fellow-crafts will also be expected to pay dues to the lodge. This is a significant change since, in the past, only Master Masons have paid dues.

The Grand Master has withdrawn his order to delay the effective date of this resolution and Entered Apprentices and Fellow-crafts will now be permitted to attend a Stated Meeting as early as October 3rd, 2012. All other details previously mentioned above are still valid.






The Stated Meeting Dinner is always at 6:30 PM, one hour before the Stated Meeting of the Lodge, which is the First Wednesday of each Month.
